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


An extensive and intrepid modern Grand Tour account through Constantinople and Turkey to Persia and Central Asia with 34 striking photographic plates. Clive Bigham was an Honorary Attaché to the British Embassy at St. Petersburg and war correspondent in the Near East, travelled at the very height of the Armenian troubles when the strict orders had been issued by Turkey that Asia Minor was to be closed to Europeans.


Interesting association copy, with the inscription of Philippe de Diesbach, officier de la Garde Royale for the ill-fated Charles X, last of the Bourbon rulers of France.

Rare on the market, and a notable 19th century account of Blondel's travels to Syria and the Holy Land. Contemporary scholars applauded Blondel for his contribution to the knowledge of the ancient region. He was one of the most important French travellers of his day, who visited the region at a strategic time for France's relations. Lebanon is covered in detail, as well as Damascus, Balbeck, Jerusalem and Aleppo

First edition, half-title, engraved frontispiece (spotted at margins), 481 pages and 'table des chapitres' on final leaf, 21.6 x 13.1 cm, occasional spotting and browning of text, two leaves with small marginal loss at the lower outer corner, contemporary calf-backed marbled boards, calf rubbed at the foot of the spine, but in very good, unmarked condition. Text in French.

First edition, with the fine frontispiece engraving of Constantinople by Friedrich Schroeder, one of the renowned engravers who participated in the team producing the illustrations for Antoine Ignace Melling's 'Voyage pittoresque de Constantinople et des rives du Bosphore'.

A lengthy critique in 'The Foreign Quarterly Review' in 1835, dismissed the well-placed Cornille's efforts (he had met Ibrahim Pacha on several occasions): 'His political bias makes him necessarily see every thing through a distorted medium', perhaps more mercifully the eminent scholar and bibliographer Angus O'Neill noted 'a routine travelogue by one who later describes himself as a Philhellene and predicts the fall of Islam.' (Koç 86a)



Second edition. Detailed analysis of the varied resources of Turkey, its mines, fisheries, and agricultural products with a chapter devoted to Turkish finances.

'The latest volume of diagnosis and prognosis on the case of the proverbially sick man of Europe is more sanguine, than the usual bulletins given by his amateur physicians. *Mr.* Farley writes like a sensible and clear-headed observer, avowedly partial to the Turkish Empire.' (The



James Lewis Farley (1823-1885), banker and writer on the Middle East, was a keen student of Turkish affairs and from his vantage point "gained a wide knowledge of [Turkey's] people and rulers, as well as of its trade and financial condition in the newly-formed Imperial Ottoman Bank" (ODNB). Written in response to the Bulgarian


massacres of 1876, his ambitiously titled work attracted both the ire and admiration of reviewers: the "London Examiner" claimed that while Farley's enthusiasm could not be considered unwarranted, it was the author's imagination that had been 'taken captive' by the country's natural resources. Farley had 'only succeeded in proving what had been very forcibly and frequently illustrated... that it was much more easy to describe the existing disorders of Turkey, than to suggest any practical means for their immediate mitigation...' However, they also noted that "nor had reviewers seen any description of life in Turkey, which gave so vivid and realisable a picture of the local government of Turkish provinces. (London Examiner, Jan 29, 1876).

A book providing valuable insights and now surprisingly uncommon, with the early signature of A. Wellesley Farley.

Fine engraved frontispiece of Constantinople by Thomas Allom, xv + 540 pages, two folding maps, Turkey in Europe and Turkey in Asia with insets, 19 x 12 cm, signed prize binding in full gilt decorated calf by Seton and Mackenzie, marbled edges, presented to a young student, Charles Erskine by Loretto House, Edinburgh in 1859, with the label on the front pastedown, occasional foxing, but a handsome edition in very good condition.

Little is known of the life of Robert William Fraser. He was licensed to preach by the Edinburgh Presbyterian Free Church in 1840, making a name for himself as an eloquent preacher. He apparently spent several years in the Ottoman Empire and the release of this work was met with critical approbation, the 'Spectator' noting that it would 'leave upon the reader's mind a clear idea of the leading features of Turkish history.'

Fraser went on to publish works of popular natural history (side-stepping any mention of the contemporary ground-breaking work of Charles Darwin).



Published at the height of great interest in the Middle East and the Holy Land with fine illustrations after original drawings by Gentil including a series on the Way of the Cross and floorplans of three sites sacred for Christians (the publisher no doubt with a keen eye for a Catholic audience): the underground church in the valley of Jehoshaphat, containing the tomb of the Virgin; the Church of Bethlehem with its underground chapels; and the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. Gentil a 'Chevalier de Saint-Sepulchre' recounts his pilgrimage in two parts, the first: from Lyon to Jerusalem via Malta, Lebanon and the Syrian coast; the second from Egypt and subsequent return to France.

Now rare on the market, this is the first edition with a re-issued title page and the publisher's pastedown with updated details and date.

Scarce and sought-after account of John Jackson's intrepid journey. A merchant, he departed Bombay by ship on 4 May 1797 for Basrah. He proceeded via the Euphrates and Tigris to Baghdad, and travelled through Kurdistan, Armorica, Anatolia, Bulgaria, Wallachia, and Transylvania, reaching Hamburg on 28 October the same year. Daunting in its scope, it was a route for the most part untested by European travellers and his disarmingly straightforward entries "always on the spot, from day to day" (preface) suggested that the route whilst dangerous, was navigable all year round.

The fine engraved plates by William Cooke (uncaptioned but described in the text) depict a "boat generally called a Donek used by the Arabs on the Tigris and Euphrates"; "Boats bound for Bagdad"; "Tatar on horseback"; "Description of a Spinning Machine"; and "The Mountains of Amasia".


Six lithographed maps with two inset maps, outline hand colour, on one sheet 58 x 88.85 cm; main half page map of Greece with the Turkish Frontier, an inset of Turkey in Europe and Greece; Island of Crete or Candia; Turkey in Europe & Bulgaria; three smaller maps of Europe, Athens and Corfu with an inset map of Corinth Canal, explanatory text in four panels on the verso, slightly soiled and foxed, professionally sealed fold splits and edge tears, this copy the "one shilling" paper coloured map edition, approx. 69 miles to English mile, in good condition.

Scarce in any edition, this map was issued in the midst of a fractious war, with no imminent resolution. The Greco-Turkish War or the Forty Days War, was relayed under a plethora of titles, but is widely considered to be the Second Greek War of Independence. The final two paragraphs of the cover text to the map read as war reportage: 'On the Turkish Frontier, in consequence of war being now declared by Turkey, military operations have rapidly developed. The Greek incursions into Macedonia have been repelled, and Edhem Pasha, assuming the offensive, has, after a vigorous resistance on the part of the Greeks, carried Miluna Pass and other points, and now threatens an advance on Larissa, in Thessaly. On the Western Frontier, chiefly at Prevesa and Arta, constant fighting is still going on with varying success for both sides.'



Lallemand was appointed at a precociously young age and later set up in business on his own, the quality of his work assuring him of the continued business of the Depôt. Highly attractive map of the Ottoman Empire published at the outset time of the Crimean War (1853-1856).





Uncommon and sought-after account of the Latin states established in Greece and the Greek islands as a consequence of the fourth crusade (lacking Crete which was till under Turkish suzerainty). William Miller earned the praise of eminent classical historians W.H.D. Rouse and J. B. Bury the latter noting that "No living student had more thoroughly mastered the details of the period, with a resulting work being as trustworthy and solid as it was clear and pleasant to read."

Issued as the Crimean War was raging, the author

Frederick Neale was a former diplomat, serving in Turkey, the Far East, as well as South Africa and Palestine. Perhaps better known for his earlier 'Eight Years in Syria' this two-volume work surveys the Islamic world from "the Saracen Caliphs in the East, in North Africa and Spain and, down to the foundations of the Ottoman Empire, and following its growth upwards into the reign of Abdul-Mehjid" (Preface).

Account of Omer Pasha and his military exploits in the Trans-Caucasian region by Laurence Oliphant, Secretary to Lord Elgin between 1853 and 1861 and companion to the Duke of Newcastle on a visit to the Circassian coast during the Crimean War. An intriguing figure, Oliphant was an accomplished diplomat and widely travelled, writing a satirical novel

'Piccadilly', as well as works on esoteric spiritualism. A contemporary reviewer noted that it was a '...great rarity for a literary man to follow an army across such a richly tinted panorama, easily and pleasantly sketching the people as they come out to see the soldiers and the guns, the landscape as it widens and varies, the battle as it explodes.' (The Athenaeum, April, 1856).

The superb illustrations were a last-minute addition arising from a contribution from fellow traveller Herr Zuther, the artist who accompanied Omer Pasha on his campaign.



First edition. Scarce, and a significant association copy.

In November 1865, Lord Russell, British Prime Minister, formed his administration following Lord Palmerston's death, and he appointed Parkinson-Fortescue (first Baron

Carlingford) Chief Secretary for Ireland. He held this post until July 1866, and again from December 1868 until January 1871 in Gladstone's first government. Russell notably published "A letter to the Right Hon. Chichester Fortescue, M.P. on the State of Ireland..." in 1868.




A contemporary critique in the 'Quarterly Review' noted of this work 'This outline which is clearly and elegantly written, and which is commonly ascribed to the pen of Lord John Russell, may be recommended to the attention of readers who want leisure or opportunity for referring to the bulky works from which the author has drawn his statements. The subject is one, we need not say, of special interest at the present moment.'


Esme Scott-Stevenson's husband, Andrew Scott-Stevenson, one of the heroes of the war in the Sudan, and Civil Commissioner of Kyrenia. She joined him in

Cyprus in 1878 and remained there until about 1882. She was ideally placed to travel to some of the more exotic reaches of the Near and Middle East.

An interesting and observant account of their journey from Kyrenia to Beirut, Aleppo, Koniah, Karamania little known to her intended audience, which could not help but appeal to all those who might cast a longing look eastward 'in spite of the ruin past rulers had inflicted upon them, yet in which so rare a beauty still lingered.' (Saturday Review, November, 1881).

Finely bound example of a scarce work. First collected edition of the travels of the three-17th century Sherley brothers. "All three Sherley brothers led a life of adventure in the Levant" (Atabey). It includes extracts from the accounts of Nixon and Parry, as well as Sir Thomas Sherley's unpublished manuscript of his travel in Turkey and a complete reprint of the very rare work by Manwaring (edited from the edition of 1607).

"The Gentleman's Magazine" in their review of the work noted the Sherley brothers to be "choice spirits of the age ... adorned by Raleigh and Sidney, and Essex, and by a crowd of warriors and of poets, who met on the confines which separated chivalry and modern manners, and who united the ancient spirit of enterprise with intellectual accomplishment."

Among his many achievements, Sir Anthony was at one stage appointed Admiral of the Levant Seas by Philip II and led an expedition to the Greek islands of Corfu, Kefalonia, Zakynthos, Skiathos and Mytilene.

Attractive Brussels edition of the work by David Urquhart, the Scottish diplomat and politician who was a strong advocate for Turkish affairs at a time when tensions were building in the Crimea. His controversial advocacy led to his recall as Ambassador to Constantinople.

For Urquhart, Turkey was a land offering limitless possibility 'contingent on her internal tranquility and political reorganisation...his most important chapter was that on the commercial resources of Turkey, offering so wide a field to British enterprise.' (Monthly magazine, or British register Jul 1833).
